3. **DELEGATIONS**

a) **Traditional Inuit Burial**

Maurice Schneiderman was in attendance on behalf of his wife, who is an Inuk Elder and wants to ensure that she is buried with her ancestors. Her ancestors are buried on the southern tip of Best Point, which is south of the two designated cultural heritage sites on Best Point. Mr. Schneiderman, on behalf of his wife, is requesting that the General Plan be amended so that the traditional Inuit burial area near the southern tip of Best Point be designated cemetery purposes, to ensure that his wife can be buried with her ancestors.

Mr. Schneiderman quoted from the General Plan and the Cemetery By-law. He stated that he is simply asking that a burial ground continue to be a burial ground.

It was noted that a Cemetery Committee has been formed and agreed that this matter be referred to that committee for review and discussion with a report back to Council.

Mr. Schneiderman noted that he is unable to speak publicly, and he is speaking on behalf of his wife tonight. He is therefore not able to speak before the Cemetery Committee. He explained that the area in question is difficult to access and not everyone would want to be buried there. He reiterated that he is speaking on behalf of his wife to ensure that she is able to be buried with her ancestors.

Deputy Mayor Brewster explained as a point of order that all City Council meetings are public, are recorded, and may be broadcast at a later date. However, committees of Council are not broadcast.

Councillor Sheppard asked Mr. Schneiderman if he could forward the written request to the Cemetery Committee and provide an explanation. Mr. Schneiderman agreed.

b) Iqaluit ETS (Ecole Des Trois Soleils) Addition

Present were Barry Cornthwaite, Manager, Capital Planning for the Department of Education; Justine LeClair, Parkin Architects; and, Daniel Nenadov, Accutech Engineering Inc.

Mr. Cornthwaite explained that Ecole Des Trois Soleils is being expanded to make the first kindergarten to grade 12 French school in Nunavut. Public consultation was held with the CFSN (Commission scolaire francophone du Nunavut), students, and staff. He noted there is a public meeting tomorrow (January 29, 2020) to provide input and ask questions.

The purpose of the presentation is to complete the public consultation with all the users and stakeholders in the school and obtain feedback to ensure the deliverable will have community use.

The following comments were made:

- The utilidor will be required to be re-connected.
- The school will have approximately 100 students.
- Consideration for a viewing space for the gymnasium.
- Maximizing the current views.
- Design schematic options will be available in three months.
- Size of expansion is 1500² metres which includes a gymnasium, four classrooms and additional support spaces.
- Estimated cost is \$10,000 to \$12,000 per square metre.
- Application has been made to Heritage Canada for some funding towards the public use portion such as the gymnasium, common areas and the classrooms that are used after school hours.
- Not aware if the Department of Education or the Community and Government Services have applied for funding for an Inuktitut school.
- Planning for expansion or constructing new schools for the Iqaluit District Education Authority.
 - Community and Government Services currently has Nakasuk School on pre-planning to develop a business case to present to the Department of Education. The Government of Nunavut then makes a decision for the entire territory.
- When designing the building, it is hoped it will be for both usefulness and aesthetically pleasing.

- Designing and building a school for education for students and teachers, but consideration is also given to the importance of having a community building with community spaces.

3. DELEGATIONS

a) Royal Canadian Mounted Police

Staff Sergeant Garfield Elliott was in attendance to present the police report from August 1, 2019 to September 30, 2019. He welcomed the new council and indicated this report was a month late due to the municipal election.

Staff Sergeant Elliott made the following comments:

- New members are in place. Calls for service are being met. There are four corporals providing enhanced supervision and are being able to stay on top of the investigations. Extra resources mean cases are being resolved in a quicker manner.
- The cooler weather traditionally means calls for service slows down.
- Extra staff are enabling the back log of files to get caught up, including the higher profile files.

- A concern with the colder weather approaching is for those who do not have a warm place to go at nighttime due to the shelter closing.
- Shack fires are a concern.
- Community outreach workers do amazing work and they try to do what they can to help those less fortunate.
- Urges the City to find a building that can be used as a shelter.
- He will be attending a discussion meeting on November 29th relating to this concern.
- Detachment cells are not a place to house people who have not committed a crime.
- Reiterated that the City had met with the RCMP and some of the Government agencies in July regarding solutions for the homeless situation, but as of today, a place has not been identified.
- Welcomed two new constables since last report.
- Detachment has switched to a 12-hour shift schedule beginning November 1st for a six-month pilot project.
- National Christmas Check-Stop Program that runs all across Canada will be Saturday, December 7, 2019. Iqaluit will be participating. The RCMP will once again partner with By-law and the program will run through to January 2nd, 2020.
- Spot checks will be happening throughout all of December and into the new year.
- RCMP will partner with the Nunavut Liquor Commission again this year in handing out taxi vouchers to those supporting sober driving.
- Other community events that the RCMP will be a part of include the Elders dinner and the Rotary Club Christmas hampers,
- The Crime Statistics Report for January 1st to October 31st, 2019 was presented. It was noted that this report includes statistics for the past the three years. The next meeting Staff Sergeant Elliott attends will show November and December 2019 stats and the year-end totals.
- Two suspicious fires were reported last week and both fires remain under investigation.

Councillor Awa inquired about the Crime Statistics Report in regard to the number of sexual assault offences and inquired how many were repeat offenders. Staff Sergeant Elliott explained he was unsure and would have to check. He went on to explain the process in terms of repeat offenders and their past history.

Councillor Awa noted that the community has to support repeat offenders. Staff Sergeant Elliott agreed. Councillor Awa also suggested letting people know who they can call if they need help, perhaps by giving out a card with the numbers listed. Staff Sergeant Elliott indicated the RCMP do contact those resources on behalf of the person in custody.

Councillor Sheppard noted he was upset when the shelter closed and indicated there is a lot of work going on in getting a new shelter re-opened. He stated progress is definitely being made and indicated that he will be in attendance at the meeting on November 29th. He indicated he is optimistic that a resolution will be coming sooner rather than later.

Councillor Sheppard inquired about diversion to justice and the fact that the stats show nothing so far this year. Staff Sergeant Elliott indicated that in some cases, the seriousness of the crime has already bypassed the diversion to justice. He indicated that he believes in restorative justice and stated that the education side on the end of the RCMP has to be in place.

Councillor Nattaq noted that crime is very high in 2019 in some areas when you look at the traditional trends from previous years and seems to be going up rather than down. He indicated that drug possession and trafficking numbers have fallen in 2019 and hopes to see it decrease even further in the future.

Staff Sergeant Elliott indicated that they are close to being back on track on their goals with a performance plan to deal with the trafficking and possession complaints on the drug end. He noted there is still a lot of work to be done and there are now resources to help deal with the problem.

Councillor Lucassie mentioned the cocaine problem in Iqaluit. She wanted to know what the RCMP would be doing about getting the dangerous drug off the streets of Iqaluit.

Staff Sergeant Elliott indicated that there are steps being taken and there are things taking place behind the scenes, however, he was unable to speak to them in a public forum. He stated that he is aware of the increase of cocaine in Iqaluit.

Deputy Mayor Brewster thanked Staff Sergeant Elliott for his report and for his time. She noted that everyone is appreciative of the work that the RCMP does. Deputy Mayor Brewster indicated she will also be attending the meeting on November 29th.

**b) Northwestel – Bell Let's Talk Day
Gabby Fuentes**

Ms. Fuentes indicated she is the Manager of Government Relation and Community Engagement. She noted that Northwestel tries to provide contributions and sponsorships to four main pillars: Arts and Culture, Youth and Recreation, Communities and Health, and Mental Health.

Ms. Fuentes stated that Northwestel has contributed about \$100,000 to Nunavut this year.

Ms. Fuentes spoke about Bell Let's Talk Day Flag Raising Ceremony. She indicated this would be the 10th anniversary of Bell Let's Talk Day. She explained that on January 10th of every year, every text sent to or from a Bell Mobility phone or with the sharing of the Bell Mobility Let's Talk video on Facebook, Snapchat or Twitter, Bell will contribute five cents to mental health.

Ms. Fuentes asked the City of Iqaluit to join Bell in a flag raising ceremony to help generate more conversation about the important cause to help end the stigma against mental illness.

Deputy Mayor Brewster asked Ms. Fuentes where and when the flag raising ceremony was. Ms. Fuentes indicated that last year it was just outside of City Hall and it is on January 29th, usually around noon. She stated that Bell will provide the flag and will do any media the City may want done. She noted they really would like to have the City of Iqaluit as a partner and Bell will do the rest.

Councillor Sheppard indicated he will make a motion to have this added to the agenda of the next council meeting and hoped some of the other councillors would support him so the City of Iqaluit can participate again.

Councillor Awa stated he will pass this on to the Recreation Department as well.

Deputy Mayor Brewster thanked Ms. Fuentes for her presentation to Council.

c) Citizen at Large
Janet Armstrong

Ms. Armstrong appeared before Council to discuss the problem of stolen bicycles in Iqaluit. She spoke about the number of bicycles she has seen over the summer near the waterways.

Ms. Armstrong stated that she feels all bicycles should be locked up at night or put in somewhere where they are safe. She noted that some people don't understand how important this is.

She noted that in most cities, bicycles are picked up by City staff and an owner is attempted to be found. She stated that the City of Iqaluit, By-law Enforcement and the RCMP need to take some responsibility to deal with the thefts. She also noted that bicycle safety has to be taught to children.

Deputy Mayor Brewster thanked Ms. Armstrong for her presentation and agreed that this issue needs to be addressed.

Councillor Sheppard indicated that a transportation master plan is being worked on by the City and it will address all forms of transport in the city, including cycling.

Ms. Armstrong stated she is concerned for those people riding bicycles now and would rather not wait for a transportation plan to be completed.

Councillor Sheppard indicated that by-law was the only thing that can be enforced, and it would take some time to put some regulations in place, but perhaps a PSA could be done in the meantime.

Councillor Stevenson agreed that it takes a lot of effort on everybody's part. He mentioned that people walking and biking should be wearing reflective tape in the dark.

Subject: **RCMP Iqaluit Police Report – November – December 31, 2019**

Please find attached the RCMP policing report for November and December, 2019 for the main crime types for the City of Iqaluit. The Detachment remained steady through the Christmas season. Members completed 32 road side vehicle checks, Dec. 7 through to Jan. 2, 2020. 33 hours were dedicated to impaired driving checks, stopping 338 vehicles, which included 11 ATV/Snowmobiles. The Detachment apprehended 1 Impaired driver, two roadside suspensions for alcohol and 1 roadside suspension for drugs. In addition, members attended Christmas social events at various venues and handed out Taxi chits, encouraging safe rides home. Members were engaged with the Elders Qammaq, the Elders Christmas Dinner and delivering Christmas Hampers. We did not get through the season unscathed, a Critical Incident response to an Armed and Barricaded subject Dec. 18 and a disturbing attempt murder investigation on Dec. 28. Although the file increase was only 600 over last year, in the last 3 years, 3100 files from 2016. Overall, I am pleased with the services the members provide and pray the detachment is supported with additional resources. To be proactive, members need time for proactive initiatives. We have initiated beverage room drop ins, random hours of the day to be a visible presence. The aim is to mitigate excessive consumption and calls for service. It will be a benefit when the Damp Shelter is operating, our prisoner count was up 239, but we had the luxury of 200 plus using the damp shelter the first six months of 2019. We have a very sound detachment, great operational leadership of the Supervisors for support and development of the dedicated front line members. I am very privileged to be their Commander and see the energy and accomplishments achieved day after day. Cst. Tyler Arsenault and his spouse arrived from Chilliwack BC in mid December. We have a new Cadet arriving early February for his field training before deploying to Cambridge Bay, Nu.

Annual Summary of Research Activities for the COMPASS Study (Licence # 01 004 17N-M) in Nunavut (January 1 2019 – December 31 2019)

A research licence was granted to the COMPASS research team by the NRI on March 15 2017. This research license is renewed annually to continue COMPASS data collection activities in Nunavut each academic year. This Annual Summary reports the activities and findings of the 2019 data collection activities.

In March 2019, the COMPASS team sought and successfully received approval from the University of Waterloo, the Nunavut Research Institute, and the Department of Education to expand COMPASS Nunavut to include focus groups as an additional source of data collection. The purpose for adding focus groups was to better understand the survey data and to evaluate the questionnaire itself for future iterations of COMPASS. Questions asked in the focus groups pertained to the students' meaning of health along with the barriers and facilitators for achieving optimal health among youth in Nunavut.

The two returning schools were approached in March 2019 to participate in the COMPASS survey and focus groups. Both schools agreed to participate in the COMPASS survey and were keen to conduct the focus groups at their school. However, due to time and fiscal constraints, the focus groups were only conducted at one of the schools. Both schools were, however, recruited for COMPASS data collections, which were for May 2019. The implementation of the survey at the first school was successful thanks to the school principal and office personnel administering the survey. COMPASS staff were present at the second data collection to ensure the successful implementation of both the survey and two focus groups.

The participating schools now have three years of student-level data. This allows us to examine how the youth health behaviours and outcomes among youth changed between 2017 and 2019 (see below for findings). School-specific findings were shared with the participating schools along with an opportunity to discuss the results and to receive recommendations of programs/policies. Moreover, the second school now has qualitative data to support their quantitative findings from the focus groups (see below for qualitative findings). These additional data will help to explain some barriers and supports facilitating these behaviours/outcomes. Based on focus group data and feedback received from Nunavut stakeholders (e.g., teachers, Department of Education), we made changes to the questionnaire for the upcoming school year; it is now shorter, easier to understand and complete, and better reflects the cultural, historical, and environmental uniqueness of Nunavut.

A COMPASS staff member was also present at the annual Nunavut principal conference in September 2019. Here, we made connections with additional principals at high schools across Nunavut and generated interest for participating in COMPASS. Moving forward, we plan to continue our research and data-sharing activities with the existing sample of COMPASS schools in Nunavut as well as expand to new schools. An increased sample size will add value to COMPASS Nunavut by being more geographically representative and by having a mix of larger and smaller communities.

Select Survey Findings: 2018-19.

Among students in Nunavut:

Obesity Outcomes:

- 66% are of healthy weight
- 34% are overweight and obese
- 18% are trying to lose weight

Physical Activity Outcomes:

- 66% are meeting the National guidelines of 60 min/day of physical activity
- 64% reported they were enrolled in PE class this year

Healthy Eating Outcomes:

- 22% of students are eating breakfast daily

Sedentary Behaviour Outcomes:

- Average total daily hours of recreational screen time: 5.2 hours/day
- 9% are meeting the National guideline of 2 hours or less of recreational screen time/day

Tobacco Use Outcomes:

- 50% have never smoked but are susceptible to begin smoking in the future
- 63% are current smokers
- 81% of smokers have made a quit attempt

Alcohol Use Outcomes:

- 18% reported binge drinking in the last month

Marijuana Use Outcomes:

- 54% reported using marijuana in the past month
- 26% reported using marijuana daily

Bullying Outcomes:

- 19% have been bullied within the last month
- 11% have taken part in bullying other students in the last month

School Connectedness and Academic Achievement Outcomes:

- 92% feel safe at school
- 80% feel close to people at school
- 34% would like to complete a post-secondary education
- 33% think they will complete a post-secondary education

Mental Health Outcomes:

- 65% rate their mental or emotional health as good, very good, or excellent
- 23% felt depressed most days in the last week
- 18% felt nervous, anxious, or on edge on most days in the last 2 weeks

Focus Group Findings: Below is a list of major themes that emerged from the focus groups.

What does 'health' mean to youth in Nunavut?

- Physical activity: being physically active is important. Some physical activities youth take part in includes hockey, hiking, badminton, and hunting
- Healthy eating: drinking water and eating a variety of foods including fruit, vegetables, and meat
- Hunting: it is healthy to eat traditional foods that come from hunting; hunting is a form of physical activity; and hunting is an opportunity to help your family, which is also healthy

What did youth identify as the main health challenges in their community?

- Substance use: smoking cigarettes, cannabis, alcohol, and hard drugs were all reported as common problems in the community
- Diet: youth are currently eating unhealthy foods
- Mental health: only a few people have good mental health in the community. Suicide was also discussed as a problem in the community

What do schools/communities do to promote health among students?

- School offerings
 - Activities and sports: for example, sports offered through the school was cited as a reason to stop smoking
 - Traditional offerings: shop class where students can make traditional tools, spring camp, and knowledge students can use while hunting were noted as facilitators to health
 - Breakfast program: gives participating students energy for the day
 - Meditation: helps calm students down and relax

What do schools/communities do that make it difficult for students to achieve health?

- Barriers to maximizing physical activity: insufficient facilities and gym equipment, unkept/messy facilities, and a lack of diversity of sports may be limiting physical activity levels
- Lack of social opportunities: respondents indicated a want for increased facilities, programming, and activities where they can spend time with friends
- Access to and appetite for unhealthy food: unhealthy food options are widely available in the community and youth enjoy them
- Lack of connection to healthy role models: youth indicated that they would like to help elders more and that role models in the community are not very physically active nor do they have positive mental health



Appendix C: Project Description

The Phase 2 Proposal

With the introduction of the Phase 2 Proposal, the Mary River Project will allow Baffinland to transport by rail and ship up to 12 Mtpa of ore from Milne Port, and to retain the current authorizations for the construction and operation of the Steensby Port and South (Mine to Steensby) Railway as proposed in 2012. The total mine production will eventually increase to 30 Mtpa, with 12 Mtpa being transported via the North Railway to Milne Port and 18 Mtpa transported via the South Railway to Steensby Port.

Highlights of The Phase 2 Proposal

Milne Port, the Mine Site, the Northern Transportation Corridor, and Shipping along the Northern shipping route are the four major Project components in the Phase 2 Proposal. The Phase 2 Proposal will involve the following additional facilities and activities:

Milne Port:

- Expansion of the Milne Port Project Development Area;
- Construction and operation of a second ore dock capable of berthing capesize ore carriers;
- Modifications/expansion of ore stockpiling;
- New ore crushing/screening facilities and ore handling systems;
- Construction and operation of railway maintenance facilities;
- Expansion of the Port Site accommodation complex, potable water treatment plant and associated sewage treatment plant;
- Expansion of the existing power plant;
- Expansion and re-purposing of laydown areas and ancillary facilities;
- Construction and operation of a landfill site; and
- Increased shipping activities through Milne Port.

Mine Site:

- Increase in total mine production to 30 million tonnes per annum (Mtpa), with 12 Mtpa transported via the North Railway to Milne Port, and 18 Mtpa transported via the South Railway to Steensby Port;
- Removal of secondary crushing;
- Construction and operation of a North Railway Terminal;
- Expansion of permanent fuel storage; and
- Expansion of the mine maintenance facilities and support administration buildings/facilities (warehouses, shops, etc.).

Mary River Transportation Corridor (Tote Road and North Railway):

- Construction of the railway embankment and railway;
- Construction/erection of signaling equipment and communication tower as required;
- Construction of multiple water crossings;
- Construction and use of multiple laydown areas, shelters, and small equipment shops at each laydown;
- Construction and operation of four temporary camp pads and mobile camps;
- Construction of several level crossings for the Tote Road;
- Additional quarry along the railway corridor;
- Ongoing inspection and maintenance of the railway embankment, railway, signaling and communication equipment, wayside condition monitoring equipment; and
- Transportation of iron ore by rail to Milne Port.

Shipping:

- Expanded shipping season based on ice conditions and Inuit use of the floe –edge, shipping will not occur any earlier than July 1 or later than November 15;
- Addition of larger capsized ore carriers into fleet of vessels calling on Milne Port; and
- Increased shipping frequency during the shipping season.

Ore Products

The Mary River iron ore is of a very high-grade, and there is no need to have additional processing beyond crushing and sizing. Crushing and screening of the ore produce two iron ore “products”:

- a lump ore product in which the pieces of ore are between 6.3 mm and 31.5 mm in size (about golf ball size), and
- a fine ore product, in which the pieces of ore are less than 6.3 mm in size (about pea size).

Closure and Post-Closure

Throughout all phases of the Project, Baffinland will plan and conduct operations in a manner designed to return the Project sites to a safe and environmentally stable condition. Baffinland will undertake ongoing reclamation activities throughout the mine life. Temporary facilities required for the construction camps will be decommissioned and removed at the end of their useful life. Borrow areas, quarries, temporary roads and other disturbed sites will be stabilized to limit erosion of ground surfaces and rehabilitated once they are no longer required. Environmental and safety monitoring will continue as long as necessary.

Potential for Future Development

The Phase 2 Proposal is designed to increase the production and transportation of iron ore to 12 Mtpa through Milne Inlet via the North Railway. The 18 Mtpa through Steensby Inlet via the South Rail is already approved. Annual production rates and the life of mine will vary with factors such as market conditions, ore grades and unanticipated events. All Project sites are thus capable of accommodating additional stockpiles, material handling equipment and personnel.

As well, regional exploration has enabled Baffinland to identify additional iron ore deposits that appear, based on surface sampling, to be of similar high-grade iron ore as Deposit No.1. Deposits No. 2 and No. 3 are located adjacent to Deposit No. 1 and have been investigated (drilled) more extensively than the other deposits. Given their close proximity to the current mine site, it is expected that these deposits will be developed either prior to or following

exhaustion of ore in Deposit No. 1, utilizing much of the same Project infrastructure. Having the mine and associated shipping, road, and railway infrastructure in place will facilitate such future development in the region.
