a) Request for Decision – Development Permit Application – DP 19-050 and Request for Variance, Lot 4, Block 6, Plan 1986 (Apex), Joelle Lavallee – Increase in intensity of use

Jennifer Jarvis, City Planner, advised that a Development Permit application was received to change the intensity of use for the Apex Bed and Breakfast, which requires a variance to increase the number of accommodation units from four to six.

Ms. Jarvis noted that based on the request to increase the number of units, staff have confirmed that the water use would not exceed 2,000 litres per day.

b) Request for Decision – General Plan Amendment Application – GPA 19-003, Lots 214 and 215, Plan 4189 (Plateau Phase 4), NCC Properties Ltd. – Amend Policy 5.1.3 (2)

Jennifer Jarvis, City Planner, advised that a Development Permit Application was received from NCC Properties Ltd. for an amendment to the General Plan for the removal of the restriction requiring metal siding on the construction of two mixed used buildings in Plateau Phase 4. The reason for the request is due to the fact that the development is in the Core Area based on the zoning map. The applicant has provided samples which are high quality and durable. The samples are available for the Committee members to view if they so wish.

out, and staff are requesting the land disposal to finalize the application so the land can be included in the lease for Northyiew REIT.

a) Request for Decision – General Plan Amendment 19-005 Inuit Owned Land Parcel "E" Development Scheme Plan 2997, Block 205, Lot 1 – Qikiqtani Business Development Corporation

Jennifer Jarvis, City Planner, advised that on November 28, 2019, Council approved Survey Sketch 19-014 which finalized the Inuit Owned Lands on Federal Road for development by Qikiqtani Business Development Corporation (QBDC). On December 3, 2019, Community and Government Services advised that the Survey Sketch was not consistent with the approved Development Scheme and required an amendment. Staff have drafted the required amending By-law No. 892.

b) Request for Decision – Development Permit Application No. DP 20-014 and SK 20-001 Amendment to DP 19-002 and SK 19-003, Plan 617, Lot 9-4 (Core Area) - Nunastar

Jennifer Jarvis, City Planner, advised that on December 20, 2019, Council approved Development Permit Application DP 19-002 and Survey Sketch 19-002. Since the approval, the applicant has submitted an additional request regarding the proposed private drive aisle easement. Staff feel that DP 19-002 and SK 19-002 should be amended to remove any reference to the private drive aisle easement.

Staff is recommending that Survey Sketch SK 19-002 be replaced with Survey Sketch SK 20-001 to maintain the easement that protects the City's infrastructure, and that the special conditions in DP 19-002 be revised to remove any reference to the private drive aisle easement.

units and each unit will have a private bedroom, bathroom and closet. A kitchen will be located on the second and third floor and a recreation room on the ground floor. There will be three parking spaces, one parking space for each of the four rooming units.

3. <u>NEW BUSINESS</u>

a) Proposed "Critical Government of Nunavut and City of Iqaluit Infrastructure Projects" Considered for 2020 Construction Season – Subject to CMOH/Community Approval

Amy Elgersma, Chief Administrative Officer, advised that the Government of Nunavut is requesting that municipalities state their preference on whether the Government of Nunavut proceed with a number of critical infrastructure projects that they have planned for Iqaluit this summer or if the municipality would like to defer some or all of the identified projects to next year.

The projects being presented by the Government of Nunavut are deemed critical, while other projects that were not deemed critical did not make the list. There are some projects that will proceed using local labour and are not on the list as the workers are local.

Based on the current status of the COVID-19 pandemic, the Government of Nunavut Chief Public Health Officer may consider options to allow the critical infrastructure projects to proceed this summer. There is no guarantee they will proceed. An important factor is Council's position regarding construction workers travelling to and working in the community this summer. If the critical projects go forward, they will have to comply with the parameters as established by the Chief Public Health Officer at the time.

Any contractors from the south would be required to complete the relevant COVID-19 restrictions, which includes the 14-day isolation period at the Government of Nunavut travel hubs in the south prior to coming to Iqaluit.

Ms. Elgersma noted that staff are reviewing the City's projects and it is expected there are a couple of critical water and sewer infrastructure projects that may be presented to Council for consideration, and if approved by Council, will be presented to the Chief Public Health Officer for approval to complete.

Ms. Elgersma also explained that private developers and companies who feel their projects are critical must complete an application process with the Government of Nunavut Chief Public Health Officer.

Ms. Elgersma reviewed the following three projects that the Government of Nunavut consider critical:

- New Deep-Sea Port and Small Craft Harbour improvements
- New Correction Healing Centre (QCHC)
- 46 multi-plexes (2020/2021)

The following questions were posed and answered.

Who prepared the document and how is the risk to public safety determined?

• The document was prepared by the Government of Nunavut – Department of Community and Government Services, based on criteria that was

developed in consultation with the Chief Public Health Officer and other Government of Nunavut offices.

Is the Government of Nunavut recommending that the projects go forward and request Council's support?

• The Government of Nunavut is recommending construction of these three projects.

It is felt that COVID-19 risks can be mitigated with proper planning and no interaction with residents, which would allow the construction to take place.

• Tower Arctic Ltd. and Kudlik Construction both have their own housing and feeding facilities, so the risk factors would be pretty low.

Ms. Elgersma advised that she would not be seeking approval or recommendation from Council on the City projects at this time. She explained that staff are reviewing the projects and have determined there are a number of projects that can be carried out using local labour.

Staff are reviewing projects and considering all options to complete the work without bringing workers from the south. Staff will present any recommendations at a future meeting. The following projects are being reviewed:

- Water pipeline replacements
- Sewer capacity upgrades
- Water Treatment Plant projects
- Wastewater Treatment Plant project

Councillor Stevenson asked about the men's shelter project and the possible need for workers from the south and a mitigation plan.

Mayor Bell advised that a request was received from the men's shelter to support two workers coming from the south. Staff have advised them to complete the application process with the Chief Public Health Officer.

Councillor Nattaq asked for an update on the men's housing for the elders. Ms. Elgersma advised that Uquutaq (men's shelter) recently applied to the City through the Reaching Home Funds to open a secondary shelter for vulnerable and elderly homeless men, which

is part of the COVID-19 Response Plan. The facility is open. The other buildings that Uquutaq has been working on for the past number of years (1077 and 1079) are not open yet and work continues for completion of the buildings.

a) Water Supply Shortage Update – Verbal

Amy Elgersma, Chief Administrative Officer, advised that staff are closely monitoring water usage. Since January, the usage has been higher than the daily target. This is due to increased bleeds, leaks, and increased usage due to the COVID-19 pandemic.

The City's Water License Amendment is effective April 1, 2020 and allows the City to pump water from the Apex River to Lake Geraldine. The Water License Amendment also requires the City to complete a Water Balance Assessment to submit to the Nunavut Water Board prior to the start of pumping. The report will include snow and ice melt into the reservoir, historical precipitation, and water demand to determine the amount of water required to be pumped yearly to supplement the reservoir.

Pumping will be carried out during spring freshet. Monitoring will be required during the summer months and pumping will start again in September to October to top off the reservoir to ensure it is full for winter.

A Public Tender for the Pumping Project was issued and closes on April 16, 2020. The requirements include off-site pumping activity, mobilization and maintenance of all required equipment, as well as 24/7 on-site personnel to monitor the system and the installed piping.

A Request for Proposal for Consultants was also issued to oversee the recording, monitoring, construction, and to also ensure the requirements of the Water License and other regulations are met.

The City continues to work toward developing a permanent long-term water supply. A Pre-feasibility Study that assesses water storage options for the long-term is anticipated to be completed in the fall.

Mayor Bell clarified that this a temporary and costly job. He explained that work is actively being carried out on a regular basis to secure funding to fix the pipes and the water situation, however, the temporary pumping project will ensure there is water until funds can be secured.

b. Emergency Response Funds – Homelessness

Amy Elgersma, Chief Administrative Officer, advised that the beginning of March, a committee was formed called the Coordinated Community Response Committee in response to the COVID-19 pandemic. The committee comprises of Mayor Bell, Deputy Mayor Brewster (Chair), representatives from the Uquutaq Men's Shelter, YWCA Women's Shelter, the Food Centre, QIA, mental health, public health, and other organizations as needed.

One of the roles of the Committee is to identify gaps in services and needs in relation to COVID-19 and help connect groups who offer services to the community, especially homelessness with funding and support as needed. Currently, the City supports the groups that offer services to the homeless through the Federal Government Reaching Home Program. This program also offers emergency funds for the COVID-19 response for the purpose of assisting homelessness programs.

The Committee identified the crowded situation at Uquutaq and recognized that another space would be required to house the vulnerable and elderly from the Uquutaq Shelter. A space has been secured and funding of \$100,000 has been allocated for the emergency fund. The Federal Government has issued an additional \$500,000 to be allocated for emergency relief for reaching home recipients and homeless programs as needed in response to prevent transmission of COVID-19.

The following allocations are being proposed:

- Uquutaq to support the operations at the centre for the vulnerable and elderly \$200,000
- YWCA Women's Shelter for isolation arrangements \$90,000 and \$15,000 for new bedding and supplies
- Food Centre for staffing and operations for the take-out program \$46,200
- \$148,800 distributed as needed for the COVID-19 response an emergency contingency that can be used to address concerns relating to homelessness and those at risk of becoming homeless

TAXI BY-LAW AMENDMENT No. 893

WHEREAS, the Cities, Towns and Villages Act, SNu., 2003, c.02, s.113 provides for the passage of by-laws to licence and regulate the operators and operation of vehicles carrying passengers for compensation; and,

AND WHEREAS the Cities, Towns and Villages Act, SNu., 2003, c.02, s110 provides for the passage of by-laws to classify, licence and regulate businesses; and,

BEING A BY-LAW of the Municipality of Iqaluit, NU, to provide for the supervision, licensing, and regulating of businesses, operators and vehicles carrying passengers for compensation within the City of Iqaluit, NU.

NOW THEREFORE PURSUANT to the provisions of the *Cities, Towns and Villages Act*, SNu., 2003, c.02, s.113 and 110 the Council of the Municipality of Iqaluit, NU, in regular session duly assembled, enacts as follows:

- 1. Amends Bylaw No. 590.
- 2. Under definitions Section 3
 - 23) "Sponsorship Letter" means a written consent from a Livery License holder that the vehicle or taxi driver will operate for the Livery License Business.
- 3. Under Taxi Driver License Section 6
 - 1) A Taxi driver license shall not be issued to a person unless that person:
 - ix) has a sponsorship letter with written consent from a Livery License Business holder confirming that the taxi driver will operate for the Livery License Business.
- 4. Under General Section 8
 - 29) Any taxi driver that quits or their employment is terminated by the Livery Business License owner shall cause immediate cancellation of the Taxi Driver License and the individual shall provide an additional sponsorship letter from another Livery Business License holder before the individual can resume operating a Taxi.

As lack-of-water supply and storage situations have been a topic for a few years the EDO recommends council support this funding application with Can-Nor in hopes to find a long-term water solution for Igaluit.
